


Castle Rock Parks & Trails Foundation FAMILY TRAIL GUIDE

Charlie and his friends noticed Bandit swipe the gift and ran after him. They chase Bandit to...






MADGE TRAIL

at QUARRY MESA OPEN SPACE

Bandit ran to Quarry Mesa Open Space. His pointy beak was ripping the gift wrapping, and items were fallling out of the mystery box. Charlie and his friends ran to the Clue Pole nearby and picked up the two clues that Bandit left behind.

ABOUT THE TRAIL

This 133 acre open space area on the west side of Rhyolite Regional Park is the site of the town's first rhyolite quarry, which opened in 1872. From the top of the grassland mesa, visitors can enjoy spectacular views of the Front Range from Pikes Peak to Longs Peak.







MITCHELL CREEK CANYON TRAIL

at MITCHELL CREEK TRAIL

From Quarry Open Space, Bandit ran through the open grassland to Mitchell Creek Canyon Trail. Charlie and his friends were close behind as more clues fell out of the mystery box.

ABOUT THE TRAIL

Access from
MITCHELL CREEK
PAVED TRAIL
From the trailhead,
take the Mitchell
Creek Paved trail
north. Then veer
east on the Mitchell
Creek Canyon soft
surface trail.

Near Founders
Village, this 1.5 mile
soft-surface trail
travels along
Mitchell Gulch.
Four habitat types
can be found here;
canyon, riparian,
ponderosa forest,
and open grassland.

From Mitchell Creek Canyon, Bandit ran to Rock Park. The friends try and keep up as clues continue to fall out of the mystery gift. Charlie puts the clues in his backpack

ABOUT THE TRAIL

Visitors can climb this historic landmark through a looped single-track trail system. Hikers can reach the base of the Rock and are afforded views of Downtown Castle Rock, the I-25 corridor, Pikes Peak and the Front Range. This hike offers rocky and uneven terrain.

Once you arrive, proceed on trail until you reach clue pole. At the pole, have your child record the clue symbols on page 10.

CHUCK'S LOOP TRAIL

AT GATEWAY MESA OPEN SPACE

From Rock Park, Bandit ran to Gateway Mesa Open Space. As the mischievous magpie contined to run, he came across a rattlesnake! Startled, more clues fell out of the mystery gift. Bandit carefully backed away and continued on the trail as Charlie, Skye, and Toby followed closely.

ABOUT THE TRAIL

This trail is on a bluff with steep, rock-capped cliffs. It features expansive views of the mountains. Beware of steep cliffs and rattlesnakes. You may also access this trail through Mitchell Creek Canyon Trail in the Founders neighborhood.









STEWART TRAIL

at RIDGELINE OPEN SPACE

Finally, as Bandit reached Ridgeline Open Space, he was exhausted. He could no longer run from Charlie and his friends. He left the package and its remaining clues on the trail, and flew up into an oak tree to take a nap. Charlie, Skye, and Toby grabbed the last clues and headed over to the MAC at Philip S. Miller Park.

ABOUT THE TRAIL

Soft surface trails through valleys and ridgelines of the 370 acre open space. Views of Front Range, open grasslands, and dense Gambel Oak.

X - clue pole

Take a right at the first junction. Stay right at 3 turnoffs.










THE MAC AT PHILIP S. MILLER PARK
